### Why study political science at Benedictine?

When you choose to major in Political Science at Benedictine University, you will:

- Develop the ability to deal with extensive writing and research projects useful in your future career.
- Have opportunities for practical work experience through internship programs in government agencies, nonprofit organizations, law firms or other related entities.
- Choose among program concentrations in pre-law, international relations, and American politics and government.
- Join our award-winning Model United Nations team at the annual conference in New York. Benedictine's Model UN teams have gained national and international recognition for outstanding performance.
- Be able to compete against other colleges in mock trial competitions.
- Have small classes taught by professors using a wide range of approaches including information technology, film and student problem-solving.
- Have access on campus to a government depository library with a large collection of government documents for research.
- Work with a faculty advisor who has an extensive background in the legal profession and/or law school.
- Take advantage of internship and other opportunities in the Center for Civic Leadership led by Distinguished Fellow and former Illinois Attorney General Jim Ryan.
- Participate in the Model Illinois Government Simulation.

### What does a degree in Political Science at Benedictine offer?

Our program in Political Science is designed to help you discover politics as a field of knowledge. The faculty attempt to communicate both theoretical and practical knowledge of political systems and their processes. The program meets your varying needs by:

- Preparing you for a professional career in government or business.
- Preparing you for graduate-level studies in political science or related areas.
- Providing a good background if you plan to go on to law school.
- Developing a strong understanding of the concept of citizenship and commitment to service.

### What careers are available with a degree in Political Science?

Your career opportunities in political science include jobs in national, state and local governments (such as urban planning, city management, staffing and budgeting), journalism, teaching, and in organizations that monitor the political processes or seek to influence the content of public policy. Also, you may choose to enter an advanced degree program for political science, law, public administration or business management. Benedictine graduates have been accepted into law schools accredited by the American Bar Association and political science graduate programs across the country.

### How does the program work?

As a Political Science major, you will complete at least 36 credit hours (12 courses) in political science subjects and nine credit hours in other social science subjects in addition to the basic college requirements for graduation. In the departmental core, you will develop a knowledge of the principles of politics, law, international relations, American national government, the judicial system, state and local government, social science research methods, and how to research and write a thesis paper. You will also acquire basic knowledge of related social sciences by completing at least one course each in sociology, psychology and economics. Your courses will vary according to the concentration you choose. The following are sample programs for various concentrations.

Political science students can focus on international relations or American politics and government, or concentrate in pre-law. Taught by dedicated teacher-scholars, the Political Science program prepares you for graduate school in a number of disciplines, or a career in law, politics or business, among others.

## The Center for Civic Leadership

Benedictine University Distinguished Fellow and former Illinois Attorney General Jim Ryan and the Department of Political Science created the Center for Civic Leadership (CLL) with the goal of preparing students to become active and responsible citizens and leaders in the community.

The CLL offers a variety of learning opportunities for undergraduates. Each year, the CLL names three Public Service Fellows who receive a \$3,000 scholarship, prestigious internships and a variety of leadership and service opportunities. The CLL brings speakers to campus to discuss current issues of domestic and international importance. Past speakers include President Barack Obama, former Illinois Governor Jim Edgar, U.S. Attorney Patrick Fitzgerald, Paul Rusesebagina, Marian Wright-Edelman and Pulitzer Prize political columnist David Broder. The annual Civic Leadership Conference brings students, community leaders and public servants together to discuss topics relevant to public service and civic responsibility. The CLL also offers special courses and holds other events for students and the community.

### POLITICAL SCIENCE PROGRAM AREAS OF FOCUS

#### AMERICAN POLITICS AND GOVERNMENT

A focus on American government will prepare you for graduate study in a number of disciplines, for law or business school, for employment in the civil service at the federal, state or local levels, and in business or journalism, among other careers. If you choose this focus, you must complete at least 20 semester credit hours with a grade of "C" or better in courses that may include the following:

- American Government
- American Foreign Policy
- Presidential Politics
- Congress and the Legislative Process
- Campaigns, Elections and Political Behavior
- Democracy and Democratization
- Women and the Law
- Religion and Politics

#### INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

A focused study in the area of international affairs will prepare you for graduate study, employment in foreign service, or a career with multinational and international companies and organizations. If you choose this focus, you must complete at least 20 semester credit hours with a grade of "C" or better in courses that may include the following:

- International Relations
- American Foreign Policy
- Genocide: The Politics of Hate, Fear, Terror and Power
- Model United Nations
- Democracy and Democratization
- International Political Economy
- Revolutions and Political Violence
- Russian and Post-communist Politics
- Nationalism and Terrorism

### POLITICAL SCIENCE PROGRAM CONCENTRATION

#### PRE-LAW

The Pre-Law concentration is interdisciplinary, encompassing a broad range of courses from numerous departments. You will become aware of government systems and social problems while gaining skills in critical analysis. The concentration is an option for Political Science majors who plan on attending law school (but is not a requirement for attending law school).

In addition to PLSC 102, 201, 105 or 205, 210, 230, 231, 243, 299 and 399 and ECON 101, students will complete 12 semester credit hours at the 300 level within the department and 15 semester credit hours of electives as approved by the Pre-Law concentration advisor, which may include any 200- or 300-level Political Science course or any other course related to the law, which may include the following:
