Message from the Chair, Department of Nursing and Health

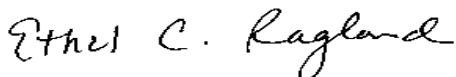

Overview of the Nursing Program

The Mission of Benedictine University

Benedictine University (BU) is dedicated to the education of undergraduate and graduate students from diverse ethnic, racial and religious backgrounds. As an academic community committed to liberal arts and professional education distinguished and guided by our Roman Catholic tradition and Benedictine heritage, we prepare our students for a lifetime as active, informed and responsible citizens and leaders in the world community

The Department Mission

The Department of Nursing and Health of Benedictine University is committed to the education of practitioners for professional nursing practice. This education occurs in an environment of intellectual inquiry, personal accountability, and cultural, racial and religious diversity. These practitioners are prepared to assume a pro-active role in their profession and in complex, evolving, health care systems.

Program Goals/Outcomes

The goals of nursing program are to:

1. Prepare liberally educated professional nurse generalists;
2. Prepare the student, as a life-long learner, with a firm foundation for graduate study; and
3. Enhance the socialization of the student as a member of the profession.

By completion of the program, the student will be able to:

1. Synthesize knowledge from nursing, the humanities, and the natural and social sciences in professional practice
2. Demonstrate skills in critical thinking and decision making in the use of nursing process with individuals, families, groups and communities
3. Evaluate research findings to guide professional practice of nursing
4. Provide health education for individuals, families, groups and communities
5. Communicate effectively with individuals, families, groups, communities and other health professionals in promoting health planning and directing client care
6. Assume responsibility and accountability for own decisions and actions in professional practice
7. Use leadership skills and knowledge of the political system to advance professional nursing practice and health care in various settings
8. Integrate professional values and ethical, moral and legal aspects of nursing into own professional practice
9. Use a process of continuing learning in the development of one's self, nursing practice, and the profession and
10. Demonstrate evolving competence in professional role within a changing, multicultural society.

Accreditation

The Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools accredits Benedictine University. The Nursing program is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Education (CCNE) through 2013. A link to CCNE's website is available through the Department's web site.

BSN Curriculum

Catalog Description of Requirements

Nursing majors must:

1. Meet University core requirements;
2. Hold a current, valid registered nurse (RN) license in Illinois;
3. Successfully complete the following courses or their equivalent:
BIOL-203(4); BIOL-208(4); BIOL-258(4); CHEM-C101 (3); PHIL-C240 (3); PSYC-C100 (3); PSYC-C200 (3) OR PSCYC-C202; SOCL-C100 (3);
4. Successfully complete the following courses with a grade of "C" or better:
NRHL-200(3); NRHL-213(3); NRHL-250(3); NRHL-290(3); NRHL-295(3); NRHL-300(3); NRHL-301(4); NRHL-311(3); NRHL-320(3); NRHL-378 (3);
5. Show evidence of current TB test, proof of immunizations, and other health requirements, and criminal background check prior to planned clinical/field experience(s); (See advisor or further information)
6. Demonstrate computer proficiency (word processing, e-mail, internet use) as evidenced by transcripts, employer documentation, or student documentation.

Schedules/Tuition

The nursing major is offered in an accelerated cohort format designed for the adult learner. Currently, the program is offered at the College of DuPage (COD) in Glen Ellyn, IL and Triton College in River Grove, IL. The 31 credits in the major and 6 credits in the common core are scheduled over nine modules in one calendar year. Schedules and tuition costs are posted on the Department website.

Course Descriptions

The nursing major (NRHL) courses are:

NRHL 200 Nursing Transitions is the first of nine nursing courses and builds upon prior learning from the behavioral sciences and the humanities. The foundation for subsequent nursing courses is provided by introducing the learner to the concepts of professional nursing practice environment. (3 credits)

NRHL 213 Health Aspects of Aging focuses upon the normal aging process in American Society including biological, psychological, and health aspects. The course emphasizes health services, health maintenance, and contemporary issues with respect to the elderly population. (3 credits)

NRHL 250 Statistics strives to make students better consumers of descriptive and inferential statistics with emphasis on statistics gathered for studies in nursing and health care. This course gives students the statistical background they need for the Research course. (3 credits)

NRHL 295 Research introduces the students to the research process. Emphasis is placed on understanding the components of the research process and critically reading published research reports. (3 credits)

NRHL 290 Health Assessment is a course that presents the client in a holistic manner when assessing the individual's health status. Opportunities are provided for integration of this course's content and the knowledge gleaned from previous humanities, natural and social science courses and the integration with the RN student's previous and current nursing assessments. (3 credits)

NRHL 300 Holistic Nursing emphasizes holistic nursing assessments, interventions, and holistic nursing diagnosis for individuals experiencing acute or chronic health problems. (3 credits)

NRHL 301 Family Health Nursing provides a foundation in the concepts and theories of family health care nursing. Clinical experience within the varied settings provides the opportunity to apply the nursing process when delivering health care to families. (4 credits)

NRHL 311 Community Health Nursing explores the physical, social, economic, and environmental factors which affect the health of a community. The nursing process is applied to groups and communities. (3 credits)

NRHL 320 US Health Care System provides a multi-disciplinary examination of various aspects of the existing health care industry in the US. The course examines the impact of managed care on process and outcomes and the governmental and economic influences on the system. (3 credits)

NRHL 378 Management focuses on the functions of management within a rapidly changing health care environment. Emphasis is placed on current issues impacting leadership and management within the context of specific practice situations. (3 credits)

NRHL 395 Nursing Elective is a course designed to provide an individualized learning experience in theoretical or clinical aspects of nursing. Students are expected to develop objectives for their learning experience, strategies that facilitate achievement of the objectives, and criteria with which to evaluate the achievement of objectives. (1-4 credits)

Registration and Billing

As a member of a nursing cohort, you will be block enrolled per term and automatically billed by the system. All 37 credits delivered in the cohort are billed at the discounted rate of 50% of regular adult undergraduate tuition. Any additional courses taken through BU's Adult Undergraduate program are billed at the regular adult undergraduate tuition rate. Your due dates and payment options are the same as BU's traditional students. The major difference being that instead of only having one due date at the beginning of the term (tuition is due 7 calendar days after the start of classes), you will have multiple due dates depending on when your class begins. In addition, A one time yearly lab fee of \$27.50 is charged to cover professional liability insurance. *To register for any BU course not offered in the cohort, contact your academic advisor who will process a course add.*

If you would like to enroll in a payment plan, please contact BU's payment plan provider, Sallie Mae to enroll in the TuitionPay Plan. You can do this at www.tuitionpay.com or by calling (800) 635-0120. You should be enrolling in either the Annual Plan (to include Fall and Spring classes) or the Fall Plan (for only Fall classes). A small enrollment fee applies. The Spring Only Plan and the Summer Plan will be available at a later date. You may also qualify for the Employer Reimbursement Plan (this needs to be approved by Student Accounts). Academic Advising

Your acceptance letter will advise you to contact your advisor for an initial advising appointment. During this appointment you will register for courses offered in the cohort, review your BSN checklist, and receive a Student Plan of Study. These documents (see attached) will outline all courses you will need to graduate and designate your academic advisor.

Faculty assign grades based upon students' performance and completion of all course requirements. The grading scale for all* NRHL courses is:

* with the exception of NRHL 250 Statistics which is listed on the syllabus

Final Grade Report Policy

Final grades can be accessed online via BenUConnect. Grades can be viewed and printed using the "View Grades" option in MyBenU. By following the print instructions (see below), a comprehensive grade report along with the University seal and logo can be printed. This official grade report can be used for tuition reimbursement programs. Some companies will allow you to log onto BenUConnect with a company representative present to verify grades for an individual term. Effective summer 2006, grades are only released through BenUConnect. If courses are in progress or not yet graded, the grade will appear as "IP". The In Progress grade does not impact the grade calculation. Grades are available only through BenUConnect and not sent through the mail. If you have any questions about the grade report policy, please feel free to contact the Registrar's Office at 630-829-6349.

Navigation to View Grades via BenUConnect

1. Log on to MyBenU. Go to www.ben.edu/mybenu from any on-campus computer or access MyBenU via BenUConnect, www.ben.edu/BenUConnect, from off campus. When you log on to MyBenU, the MyBenU homepage appears.
2. Click on "SA Self Service" – A page will appear with options for self-service,
3. Click on "Learner Services" – A page will appear with options for learner services.
4. Click on "Academics" – A page will appear with academic options.
5. Click on "View My Grades" – The grade report for the current term will appear. If you wish a grade report from another term, click on "Select a Different Term" – A page will appear which lists all terms you have enrolled in. Select the appropriate term.
6. To print the grade report, click File > Page Setup and select the Landscape Orientation option.
7. To print the grade report with the University seal, one must, on the browser toolbar, click Tools > Internet Options > Advanced Tab. Then scroll down to the printing options near the bottom and make sure the "Print background colors and images" checkbox is checked.
8. Log out of MyBenU – For security reasons, log out of the system by clicking the "Sign Out" icon in the upper right hand corner of the page.

Withdraw / Drop Policy

If you are admitted and drop prior to the start of your cohort, you will be waitlisted for a future cohort. Should circumstances arise preventing you from completing your cohort, re-admission into a future cohort will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

Incompletes

Students who are doing passing work but who fail to complete all course requirements on a timely basis due to illness or other circumstances beyond the students' control may petition the instructor for the grade of "I". This petition must be agreed upon and signed by both the faculty member and the student and delivered to the SSC before the end of the class. The student who subsequently fails to complete all course requirements by the stated time,

usually 180 days, will have his/her grade of "I" changed to an "F". Arrangements for the "I" grade must be made before the final class meeting and/or the final exam. Incompletes are not provided merely because a student is pressed for time.

Application for Graduation

Students applying for graduation must complete an application. Application deadlines are published each year in the University master calendar. Note that you must submit your application nearly eight to nine month in advance of your graduation date.

The completed application for graduation form and processing fee may be submitted to Benedictine Central. Application forms with current due dates are available on the Department web site @<http://www.ben.edu/nursinghome>.

Benedictine University Student Academic Honesty Policy

The search for truth and the dissemination of knowledge are the central missions of a university. Course Absence Policy

Students are required to attend all classes. Guidelines on attendance are found in course syllabi. Note that attendance and class participation are not the same.

Canceled classes may be needed to be rescheduled, depending upon the nature of the learning that was missed. The faculty member will confer with the department chairperson as needed about alternative meeting times (sometimes established by administrative areas in the University).

Conflict Resolution Procedure

The online Student Handbook (linked from the Department web site) describes the academic appeals and academic honesty policies, the procedures for a grade appeal, and conflict resolution (grievance) policies and procedures.

If a nursing major wishes to proceed with a complaint regarding an academic dispute of any nature (for any course), he/she should proceed in the following sequence for the most efficacious response. A written record of all communications should be maintained throughout the process by the student and as it would be required in the event of an appeal. The student proceeds to the next level, if the prior level does not resolve the complaint.

1. Communicate directly with faculty member.
2. Communicate with academic advisor.
3. Communicate with Department Chair. As requested, the Department Chair communicates, in writing, the appeal process.
4. File a written notice of appeal providing the needed documentation per the request of the Department Chair (e.g., unadulterated electronic file and paper copy of assignments or projects in question, original grading rubrics completed by instructor, written explanation).
5. Meet with Department Chair.
6. Meet with Dean of the College of Education & Health Services

Student Resources/Services

Organizations and Committees

Sigma Theta Tau, International Honor Society of Nursing

Benedictine University received a charter for Lambda Upsilon Chapter at Large in 1990. This society recognizes scholarship and leadership in nursing. Nursing research and publications are promoted through chapter activities.

To be eligible for membership you must have a minimum GPA of 3.0, rank in the upper 35 percent of your class, and have completed at least one half of the nursing curriculum. Inductions are scheduled yearly in the fall.

Student Advisory Committee

The Department has a Student Advisory Committee to provide student participation in governance. The Committee participates in the review and planning of curriculum components and reviews and makes recommendations regarding student welfare issues. To accommodate the multiple demands on your time, the Committee is available in "virtual" form and is accessed using your WebCt/Blackboard account.

If the problem relates to a course, immediately discuss the problem or situation with your instructor. Contact information for your instructor can be found on your syllabus. If the problem is not satisfactorily resolved or is related to major or graduation requirements, please discuss the issue with your academic advisor (and refer to Conflict Resolution Procedures).

Financial Aid, Scholarships and Loans

Many opportunities exist for BSN students in need of financial assistance. Grants, low interest bank loans, or scholarships may be available from the government, corporations, community or civic groups, philanthropic and religious organizations, and Benedictine University. A student should always ask, even if he/she does not believe him/herself to be eligible for financial aid, as there often are Merit Scholarships based on academic performance available as well.

It is the responsibility of each student to consult with a Benedictine Central representative about the guidelines regarding qualification and application of financial aid.

In general students must be degree-seeking and carry a minimum of five (5) credit hours per term in order to potentially be eligible for financial aid. The level of aid awarded can be impacted by the number of credits a student carries in a given semester.

In order to receive financial aid students must complete a FAFSA form, and have their information (via the FAFSA) sent to Benedictine University. The university school code is 001767.

Policy for Use of Edited Standard Written English*

The BSN program requires that papers be written in edited standard written English (ESWE) and APA format (see below)

Suppose a group of people were living on an island, all using the same language, until one day the island broke in two, separated by impassable water. In one hundred years, with no contact, would the people on both halves still use the same language forms? No. Human language is always changing. Language on each half of the island would evolve with different forms and rules. Neither would be better in any absolute sense—just different. Similarly, in the United States, language variations have developed among people separated by culture, socioeconomic status, or geography.

However, the language of the ruling class commonly comes to be regarded as standard. In the United States, the “standard” is the language of the white middle and upper classes. Forms of English developed by people of color and by people who have been poor or geographically isolated (as in Appalachia) are sometimes said to be “bad” or “incorrect” English, but such forms are only different, not bad. Each form of English has its own rules. People who say “she working” are not speaking “bad” English; they are using a different set of rules for forming the present tense.

One of the tasks of a good education is to make students aware of these facts about language. Another task of education, however, is to prepare students to function effectively in the world where readers generally expect writers to use Edited Standard Written English (ESWE).

On **finished, final, formal papers** (not on drafts, in-class writings, or writing specifically labeled as informal), you must have no more than an average of two departures from ESWE per page, in any combination of the following areas:

- End-of-sentence punctuation (avoid run-on sentences, comma splices, fragments, or misuse of semicolon). Occasionally you may use a fragment or comma splice for a special effect. Label it in the margin.
- Verb forms (use ESWE rules for adding *-ed* and *-s*, for using helping verbs, and so on).
- Verb tense (avoid confusing shifts in verb tenses).
- Agreement of subject and verb.
- Pronoun form (use ESWE rules to choose between *I* and *me*, *she* and *her*, *who* and *whom*, and so on).
- Agreement of pronoun with antecedent (the antecedent is the word the pronoun refers to).
- Use of apostrophe *s* and the suffix *-es*.
- Use of quotation marks for all quoted words.
- Spelling (a typo counts as a misspelling).
- Proper sentence sense (no words omitted, scrambled, or incomprehensible).

GRADUATION REQUIREMENT: Students must submit a total of 120 semester credit hours (with a minimum G.P.A. of 2.0 from Benedictine University courses) of which 55 must be completed at a four-year regionally accredited college and at least 30 semester hours, including 12 credit hours at the 200+ level in their major field, must be from Benedictine University.
