<p>J</p>		<p>Jaeger Residence Hall</p> <p>Jaeger Hall, the campus' first residence hall, was constructed in 1950-51. It is an all-female predominately freshman hall and houses a total of 125 students on four floors.</p>
<p>H</p>		<p>Krasa Student Center</p> <p>In the Krasa Center you will find (in alphabetical order) Benedictine Central Express (registration/financial aid/student accounts), the Bookstore, Career Development, the Dining Hall, & Eagles Nest, Health Services/Counseling, International Center, Mail and Copy Center, Meeting and Seminar Rooms, Moser Fireside Lounge, Presentation Room, Public Safety, Switchboard, Residence Life, St. Benedict Chapel, Student Activities, and University Ministry, and the Academic Resource Center (ARC).</p>
<p>I</p>		<p>Sports Complex</p> <p>The Sports Complex at Benedictine University in Lisle provides top quality football, soccer, track, softball and baseball fields for Benedictine University and the local community.</p>
<p>M</p>		<p>Benet Academy</p> <p>This private co-educational college-preparatory Catholic high school traces its history from the establishment of St. Joseph Bohemian Orphanage in Lisle in 1899 by the monks of St. Procopius Abbey. The Academy's long history reflects the education of young men at St. Procopius Academy and young women at Sacred Heart Academy. The two Academies operated separately until they merged in 1967. The co-educational, Benedictine school was then named Benet Academy.</p>
<p>L</p>		<p>Neuzil Residence Hall</p> <p>Neuzil Hall is an upper-class coeducational residence hall for students. The hall consists of suite-style rooms, each housing a total of four students for a total population of 158 students. Neuzil Hall is the northernmost hall and is closest to the Dan and Ada Rice Center.</p>
<p>K</p>		<p>Dan & Ada Rice Center</p> <p>The Dan and Ada Rice Center is the home venue for all Benedictine University indoor athletic events. It also serves the campus as the main recreational center for Benedictine students who have access to open gym time, weight training equipment, fitness equipment, open swimming times, intramural sports and other campus recreational pursuits. Special events, such as concerts, speakers, forums and ceremonies are also held in the Rice Center.</p>
