



Applying for Financial Aid

At Benedictine University, the Office of Financial Aid understands that sometimes applying for federal assistance can be daunting. To assist students in navigating the process, we have provided a list of steps to guide our students through applying for financial assistance.

1. Review Federal requirements for federal student aid eligibility.

To receive federal financial aid, you must:

- Be a U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen and registered with Selective Service (if required).
- Be enrolled at least half-time in a degree-seeking program (audited, repeated, and other non-credit classes do not apply).
- Making satisfactory academic progress.
- Demonstrate financial need.
- Not be in default on any loan or owe a refund on any grant made under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, at any institution.

2. Apply for and Create a Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID.

The [FSA ID](#) is the username and password that you will use on all federal student aid websites. You will need this FSA ID to complete your FAFSA each year. *If you are a dependent student, your parent will also need to create an FSA ID.*

3. Complete your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

This free application serves as a gateway for all federal, state, and Benedictine University need-based financial assistance. Keep in mind, some funding is awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. Students should complete their [FAFSA](#) as soon as possible each year, starting on October 1st.

Be sure to use the IRS's Data Retrieval Tool to import your tax information if it is available to you. If it is not available, you will need federal tax transcripts or tax returns to complete the application. Estimated data can be used and updated later.

Include Benedictine University's federal school code: **001767** so that the results of your FAFSA application will be automatically sent to the BU's Office of Financial Aid. Please be aware that it can take several business days for the Department of Education to process your application.

4. Review your Student Aid Report.

Once your FAFSA has been processed by the Department of Education, you will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR). This email reviews estimates of your eligibility, as well as any additional steps required to receive federal funding.

All students using federal student loans for the first time should complete a [Master Promissory Note](#) and [Loan Entrance Counseling](#).

Approximately 1 out of every 3 FAFSAs is selected to complete a process called verification. If your FAFSA is selected by the Department of Education, you will need to submit additional documents in order to receive aid.

5. Review your Financial Award Notification.

Once the Financial Aid Office receives your FAFSA results, we begin the process of awarding all accepted students based on their FAFSA. You will receive a financial aid award notification by mail after your awards have been offered to your account. You can also view your awards on your [MyBenU](#) account.

This award notification will encompass all federal, state, and institutional funding that a student is eligible to receive, including academic scholarships. These scholarships are based on each student's academic record and are awarded at the time of a student's acceptance.

6. Accept or adjust your awards.

Students who wish to decline a financial aid award or reduce the amount of the award must sign and return their award notification within fourteen (14) days of its receipt.

7. If needed, apply for additional funding through local, regional, and national outside scholarships.
